

Ableist Infrastructure


Aspects of the built environment, communication networks, policies, laws, and language that oppress people with disabilities.

Borders


Imaginary geographical lines between states that limit the free movement of people and distribution of goods.

Climate Refugees


The mass migration of people forced to flee their homes due to extreme weather events like drought, wildfires, and hurricanes.

Gender-based Violence


Harms in physical, sexual, psychological, and economic form repress and punish people along hierarchies of gender.

Homelessness


Privatized property relations and the lack of social housing thwart universal access to the stability, safety, and shelter of a home.

Hunger


Enough food is available to nourish the world's population, and yet, millions are denied access to adequate nutrition.

Medical Debt


Costly yet necessary medicine and healthcare forces many to choose between debt and bankruptcy or their wellbeing.

Nuclear Weapons


We live under threat of global destruction by warheads that — even if disarmed — will remain radioactive for 100,000 years.

Police Violence


The police enforce social hierarchies, protect property, and repress political dissent through a monopoly on violence.

Water Crisis


Water pollution, contamination, dispossession, and overuse threaten human and non-human access to means of life.

Bureaucracy


A small class of administrators, professionals, and managers control information, gatekeep resources, and enervate people with nonsense.

Disease Pandemics


Most infectious outbreaks are cross-species in origin, with transmission exacerbated by overcrowding due to habitat destruction and factory farming.

Gun Violence


Blowback from imperialist wars triggers a vicious and profitable cycle of fear, armament, and death.

Soil Depletion


The Earth is losing its thin layer of living soil due to the growing rift between where food is grown, consumed, and defecated.





n. [ruh-spaan-suh-bih-luh-tee]


The taking of accountability for, and the fulfillment of, ethical duties or obligations.

The freedom to make decisions and act in the absence of external control.



A bond of unity around common goals, interests, principles, or responsibilities.



The entitlement of everyone in a community to the essential means of life.



In accordance with reality; the facts of the matter; veracity; sincerity.



The free use and enjoyment of resources, so long as they are not harmed in the process.



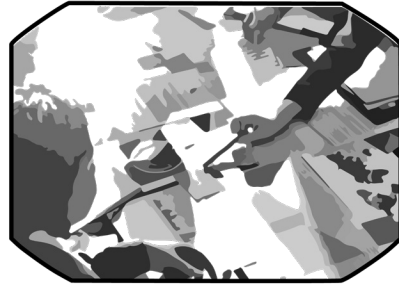

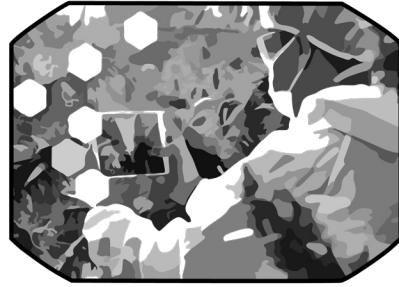
